Your Excellencies, colleagues, friends and members of the wider Loden mandala both in Bhutan and abroad,

What I have just chanted is the mantra of dependent-arising or tendrel, the Buddha's philosophical and spiritual slogan and his concise theory of how the world works. Everything in existence comes from a nexus of numerous causes and conditions. Nothing arises without any cause or from a fixed singular source. Good results emerge from the meeting of good causes and conditions, and bad results emerge from the meeting of bad causes and conditions. From big issues like the current crisis in the Middle east to the little chilli sapling we may be growing on our kitchen window sill, we need to understand and align our efforts to this law of nature and process of causation to attain favourable outcomes.

This truth of dependent origination, interdependence and interconnectedness cannot be more manifest and applicable than it is the case here today as we celebrate 25 years of Loden. The tall tree that Loden has become with a stellar truck of support, many branches of its programmes, activities numerous as leaves, its sweet scent of success and fruits of benefit, and the cool shade of solace it has brought to many, is an outcome of many causes and conditions; many kind thoughts, meaningful words and wholesome actions.

The second wheel is wheel of great beings (﴿) NT STATAT), who inspire and lead us. As a result of the societal advancement mentioned earlier, we have many leaders both spiritual and secular, from the kings and high lamas to village elders who lead and guide us. Without role models and champions to look up to, we cannot find the right direction we need in this VUCA world that is volatile, uncertain, complex and ambiguous at the same time. In this respect, I would like to remember today HH Penor Rinpoche, my teacher and several dozen other masters who have planted the seed of bodhicitta in me and inspired me to start Loden.

The third wheel is the wheel of one's own aspiration and motivation to do good (থিবাৰ্থামেই খ্রান্ত্র). One must have this crucial element of an individual resolve to benefit the world. In other words, one must cultivate the precious thought of awakening, jangchubsem, to take all sentient beings out of ignorance and misery to the state of happiness and enlightenment.

The fourth wheel is (བསོད་ནངས་ལྡོ་རྡུ་) the wheel of resources, primarily the accumulation of merit. One must have the capacity, resources, tools, means, and above the meritorious action and hard work to execute a project. Real sonam or merit is one's virtuous action. Without action, a good intention cannot alone help one accomplish any worldly or spiritual mission in life.

On this day, I and the rest of the Loden team would like to express our gratitude – gatsor – to these four wheels, which remain the essential for our work since 1999.

On a personal level, I would like to particularly convey my heartfelt gatshor to four sets of people who have believed in me and joined me in my modest but sustained work of charity and voluntary service for a quarter of a century. Like the four wheels above, these four wheels of human resources and connections helped bring Loden to where it is today. First and foremost are the fellow trustees, from the founding trustees in 1999 (Late Anthony Aris, Elizabeth Chatwin, Colin Franklin, William Douglas, to current trustees of the Loden Foundation in Bhutan, Loden Education Trust in the UK, Loden Initiative Fond de Dotation in France, many of whom are present in person or online with us. I would like to specifically thank Sangay Tshering, our current President. A beneficiary of Loden in 2010, you have impressed us not only with your abilities but also with your commitment to social

work. I have watched the numerous hours you give each week to Loden and appreciated

how you take care of the needy, as demonstrated by how you took Lobzang and Jambay

into our fold. I could not have found a better person to work with.

The second class of people are the staff, from our first coordinator and director Dorji Tashi hired in 2008 to our current group of dedicated, dynamic and diligent team. Like any other organization in Bhutan, Loden has seen a high rate of attrition but we have this belief that Loden always got staff with outstanding dedication and diligence. When they leave, we like to believe that we have enhanced their capacity to excel in life, and that Loden has entered their DNA so that they will continue to be one of us. I would like to thank many hundreds of interns who have walked through the halls of Loden for your free time and service. We hope we have left an indelible mark on your life.

The last set, but not least, are our supporters and partners. They include our stalwart supporters such as Anne and Gerard, William, Eric, Thierry, Noriko, Tadashi, Yeone, Alison, and many others who not only provided generous financial support but also give a lot of time to represent Loden in different countries, mobilize resources, and help run our programmes. Among our supporters are also several dozen institutional partners (83 in 2023), and individuals who help us run our programmes.

Today, I take this opportunity to pay respects and express our most sincere gratitude – gatshor – to these four sets of people, the four wheels on which Loden has come thus far and will continue to travel further.

As we gather here, after 300 months of engagement and many numbers and stories to showcase our achievement, we come together again with a renewed spirit to refine our work and enhance our impact. Thus, more than celebrating our past, we chose to forge a better future by having a sense-making session on all three of our main programmes.

As we delve into this sense-making exercise and assess our significance, role and relevance, I would like to briefly reflect on the overarching goals and aspirations, ideals and values, mission and vision that we sought 25 years ago and regularly reevaluated.

Loden initially started with the aim of fostering a happy society through the promotion of education and learning, and gradually expanded to include business education in the form of social entrepreneurship, and cultural preservation and promotion. Today, Loden runs three main programmes of Loden Education Programme, Loden Entrepreneurship Programme and Loden Cultural Programme, with many sub-programmes in each of the programme areas.

Allow me to share very briefly the ethos and ideals which inform our efforts in these three programmes. In education, while Loden supports the goals of mainstream education such as literacy, numeracy, skills, certificates and degrees, we try to remind ourselves that the ultimate goal of education and our efforts should be geared to building human capacity and capable citizenry. From our Early Learning Centres through our scholarships to the SEED programme, we strive to focus on the inner qualities of youth such as critical thinking, curiosity, determination, diligence, conscientiousness, empathy and such other inner qualities. While focus on areas such as STEM is important, in a rapidly changing world where we cannot even predict what will be required in the job market in five years' time, we believe more in the inner traits of determination, dexterity, discipline, and in an educational support which combines holistic development of the child combining the head, heart and hands, and conjoins the traditional values of wisdom and compassion.

In order to achieve this, we rely on our second programme of cultural preservation and promotion to understand where we come from and where we are heading, sometimes mindlessly. By documenting the oral, intangible, written and artistic traditions and cultures of Bhutan we hope to understand our past, assess our present and design our future. In this respect, our role lies in the thorough understanding of the cultural elements so that we can facilitate an effective transmission, creative reappropriation, and eloquent reformulation of timeless values of wisdom and compassion.

Our third programme derives inspiration from such a culture of wisdom and compassion in both theory and practice. While seeing the immediate need to address rising youth unemployment, economic dependency, rampant consumerism, and unprecedented migration we also aspire to foster a culture of innovation, enterprise, and ethics in the business sector. Through our training and funding, we promote only socially responsible, environment friendly, culturally sensitive, and innovative businesses, which can solve socioeconomic problems and fill societal gaps. We strive to foster a culture of tshongrig or intelligent business, and a caring economy of responsible production and conscientious consumption.

With these common aims and aspirations, values and concerns, I invite you all once again to join us as we begin a new chapter of Loden – another 25 years of unwavering service.

As the Loden Foundation enters its 26th year, it is fitting to reflect on its achievements while also looking ahead to the next 25. The vision of Dr Karma and One and Gerard Tardy in creating the entrepreneurship programme was and remains remarkable.

You might say, "What's not to like about providing interest-free loans to emerging entrepreneurs?" But it is not as simple as that.

Twenty-five years ago, Bhutan did not have a culture of entrepreneurship. I recall concerns that no one would apply when the programme was first announced but, of course, they did. Over the past 25 years, the Government has launched many initiatives to kickstart entrepreneurial activity, yet their success has often been limited, and some have been short-lived.

What makes Loden's approach different and successful is:

- A rigorous selection process, requiring business plan submissions followed by in-person interviews for shortlisted applicants-these can be highly challenging, like The Thunder Dragon's Den!
- A focus on quality over quantity, supporting only business ideas that appear sound rather than setting annual targets for the number of businesses funded.
- A fully transparent and independent selection process.
- A dedicated team that understands business challenges and maintains regular contact with entrepreneurs whenever possible.



PRE SCHOOL

Early Childhood Care and Development (ECCD) centers offer a nurturing environment for children to develop essential skills through play-based activities, laying a strong foundation for lifelong learning, and the Loden Foundation has played a significant role in promoting early childhood education in Bhutan since 2008. Loden established five Early Learning Centres (ELCs) for children aged three to five in Bumthang, Mongar, Samtse, Paro, and Zhemgang, emphasizing cognitive, emotional, and social development, and successfully handed over two of its Early Learning Centers to the community.

In 2024, a total of 60 children completed their graduation from our Early Learning Centers

Since 2008, more than 811 children have graduated from Loden ELCs.

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POST SCHOOL SCHOLARSHIP



The Loden Foundation launched the Post Scholarship Programme, aiming to empower young people through education that nurtures both the mind and the heart.

The Post Scholarship Programme is designed to support talented and deserving Bhutanese students by offering financial support of up to Nu. 300,000 (US\$3,500) per academic year to pursue undergraduate or diploma programmes with the goal of empowering future leaders, especially from low-income families. This scholarship reflects the foundation's commitment to empowering youth and fostering a new generation of skilled professionals and leaders.

13 students received the Loden Scholarship in 2024 including one scholar with special needs who was sponsored.

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BHUTAN DIALOGUES

The Bhutan Dialogues, an initiative by the Loden Foundation, fosters critical discussions among thought leaders, drawing upon their expertise, achievements, and inspiration. It is a forum for right speech and mindful listening.

By leveraging virtual sessions and live streaming, the foundation ensures broader engagement on key topics like mental health, disaster preparedness, and educational reforms, addressing Bhutan's pressing issues.

STUDENT BODHISATTVA INITIATIVES

The Students Bodhisattva Initiative is launched to empower school students in Bhutan to creatively tackle local community issues. It was Initiated at Ura Middle Secondary School and Jarkar Higher Secondary School in Bumthang, the program provides small grants to students, allowing them to brainstorm solutions, develop proposals, implement projects, and report on their results.

This initiative promotes practical problem-solving and encourages youth engagement in their communities.

One of the notable projects under this initiative is the Gola Gola Bhutan, which has involved 150 young participants across six districts since its launch in 2022. By emphasizing real-world challenges and fostering student-led solutions, the Student Bodhisattva Initiative aims to nurture a generation of socially responsible leaders in Bhutan.

GOLA - GOLA BHUTAN

Gola-Gola Bhutan (GGB), founded on May 22, 2022, by students of Jakar HSS, is a youth-led initiative promoting social and environmental responsibility. Supported by the Loden Foundation, GGB has grown to nearly 200 volunteers collaborating with Save the Children, the EU, and Druk Ride. The initiative redistributes clothing, promotes sustainability, and advocates for conservation, benefiting over 10,000 people through clothing drives, school campaigns, and GGB Clubs.

In 2024, GGB launched the Clothing Donation Drop Box Project, placing ten drop boxes across six Dzongkhags and two Thromdes to simplify donations and support vulnerable groups. Campaigns like SHIFT raise awareness about fast fashion's impact, while emergency responses, such as aiding Ammochu fire victims, reinforce GGB's commitment to community support.

Moving forward, GGB aims to formalize its status, expand drop box locations, and enhance recycling facilities. By strengthening partnerships and securing government funding, it seeks to drive long-term transformation through sustainability and social equity.

The Loden Foundation's Bi-annual Spring and Fall Calls foster entrepreneurial growth in Bhutan by inviting innovative business ideas aligned with national priorities like job creation and economic resilience. Selected entrepreneurs receive interest-free loans, mentoring, and support to build sustainable, socially responsible, and culturally sensitive businesses, contributing to Bhutan's development

Since 2008, a total of 301 entrepreneurs have received interest free, collateral- free loans through our start up funding programme.

Our mission is to provide Thimphu's urban residents with year-round access to fresh, nutritious vegetables, while equipping them with the necessary skills and tools for home cultivation. We envision becoming Bhutan's leading promoter, educator, manufacturer, and supplier of vertical tower farming technology.

Phuensum Dairy, based in Danglo near Thimphu, is a thriving dairy business that collects, processes, and distributes fresh milk and curd. 

AGRI TECH INNOVATION CHALLENGE

AGRI TECH INNOVATION CHALLENGE featured Critical Skills Training, Networking & Mentoring Sessions, and a Pitch Day for the top 10 participants. Loden held the SEED programme from 4–9 November 2024, the programme took place at three esteemed institutions: Druk School, Royal Thimphu College, and Choki Traditional Art School.

BHUTAN SOCIO ECONOMIC FORUM

The Bhutan Socio-Economic Forum (BSEF) 2024, organized by the Loden Foundation with support from The Asia Foundation, launched its inaugural session on December 2, 2024, at the Thimphu Deluxe Hotel.

The forum focused on addressing Bhutan's socio-economic challenges and promoting sustainable growth in line with the country's Gross National Happiness (GNH) philosophy. Key discussions included economic diversification, the role of the private sector, and aligning growth with GNH values, Addressing Structural Challenges, Inclusive Development and leadership in Economic Transformation.

With "From Present to Prosperity: Bhutan Economic Outlook," as the theme, the event served as a platform for inclusive dialogue, bringing together policymakers, development economists, private sector leaders, and civil society representatives.

CULTURE PROGRAMME

Loden Foundation's Culture Programme is committed to preserving, promoting, and safeguarding Bhutan's unique cultural heritage. The programme operates across three core domains: oral culture, written heritage, and art and artifacts. Its primary objective is to document and record endangered tangible and intangible cultural heritage, ensuring that future generations can appreciate and uphold their cultural legacy. Recognizing the urgency of preservation, the programme actively works to safeguard invaluable traditions and knowledge before they are lost.

Originally, the Shejun agency led Bhutan's oral culture documentation and research from 2013 to 2017. Now merged with Loden Foundation's Culture Programme, the initiative has successfully collected 3,348 hours of audio-visual content and 123,855 photographs of cultural artifacts and practices. Additionally, it has organized 15 cultural events and published five biographies of Buddhist masters, contributing significantly to Bhutan's cultural documentation.

In 2016, The World Bank funded Loden Foundation to produce documentaries focusing on cultural sites, features, artifacts, and oral histories of the Talo-Nubgang and Chimi Lhakhang areas. This project was successfully completed, yielding valuable documentation of these historically significant locations.

In 2019, the University of Vienna's Department of South Asian, Tibetan, and Buddhist Studies launched the Borderlands Kanjur Project, offering to digitize a set of Kanjur at Trashiyangtse Dzong. This project resulted in 45,164 high-quality digital images, further contributing to the preservation of Bhutan's written heritage.

More recently, the Endangered Archive Programme (EAP) funded the EAP-1494 project, supporting the digitization of manuscripts in 20 remote archive centers across seven Dzongkhags. To date, this initiative has expanded to cover more than 70 archive centers through various EAP-funded projects, collectively amassing an impressive total of 4.88 million digitized pages altogether. Half of these have been submitted to the National Library and Archive of Bhutan, the Central Monastic Body, and Loden's office to ensure the protection of the original images. The EAP projects play a crucial role in preserving endangered manuscripts through advanced digital imaging techniques.

Further strengthening its commitment to cultural preservation, Loden Foundation has been selected by the International Information and Networking Centre for Intangible Cultural Heritage in the Asia-Pacific Region (ICHCAP), under UNESCO's auspices, to produce 10 documentary films on Bhutan's intangible cultural heritage.

Through its extensive documentation and digitization efforts, Loden Foundation is making a lasting impact on safeguarding Bhutan's cultural heritage. By acting now, the programme ensures that future generations inherit a well-preserved and accessible record of Bhutan's rich traditions, allowing them to appreciate and continue the legacy of their ancestors.

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
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RESTORING PAGAR TEMPLE'S LOST SCRIPTURES

In March 2012, the historic Pagar temple suffered a devastating fire, reducing its invaluable collection of scriptures to ashes. Recognizing the immense loss, the Loden Culture Programme has made efforts to restore part of this literary heritage. Last week, 150 volumes of digital manuscripts were reinstated in the reconstructed temple, ensuring the survival of Pagar's sacred texts.

The digital preservation efforts trace back to 2010, when Loden's team initiated a documentation project at the neighboring Tshamdra monastery. Despite official permissions, the work was halted by a local elder, and tragically, the original manuscripts were lost in the fire two years later. However, thanks to the dedication of Dorji Gyaltshen and Lhakpa Gembo, many of the texts had already been digitized, enabling this partial restoration.


Pagar temple, historically known for its excellence in scripture production and recitation since the 18th century, was a cornerstone of Bhutan's literary tradition. The fire serves as a stark reminder of the fragility of Bhutan's cultural heritage and the urgent need for its preservation. The recent restoration is a step toward safeguarding this legacy for future generations.



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Thanks to the foresight and dedication of Dorji Gyaltshen and Lhakpa Gembo, 150 volumes of Pagar temple's sacred texts were preserved in digital format before the devastating fire, ensuring that at least part of its literary heritage survives.







SAVING ENDANGERED ARCHIVES

The year 2025 begins on a high note with remarkable achievements from the Loden Culture Programme. One of its most significant milestones is the successful completion of the Endangered Archive Programme (EAP-1494), dedicated to digitizing and preserving Bhutan's invaluable manuscripts. Over the past two and a half years, this project has digitized archives from more than 31 remote centers across seven districts.

Collectively, we have digitized around 70 archives including temples, Dzongs, and private libraries, amassing a collection of around five million images. To ensure the safeguarding and accessibility of these invaluable records, copies of the digitized documents will be preserved at the Loden Foundation office, the National Library and Archives of Bhutan, and the Library of the Central Monastic Body.

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DIGITAL AND DOCUMENTARY APPROACHES TO SAFEGUARDING BHUTAN'S INTANGIBLE HERITAGE

With globalization rapidly influencing lifestyles and perceptions, Bhutan's rich intangible cultural heritage faces increasing threats amid fast-paced socio-economic development. Modern influences, particularly Western education and rural-urban migration, have accelerated cultural shifts, making the preservation of Bhutan's traditions more urgent than ever.

Recognizing this, the Loden Foundation initiated a five-year oral culture documentation project in 2013, capturing Bhutan's rich oral traditions through digital audio-visual tools. While documentation is a crucial first step, effective preservation requires further efforts in research, publication, and media production.

As part of our ongoing commitment to cultural preservation, Loden is undertaking a video documentary project to refine and enhance previously collected footage into high-quality productions. These documentaries will contribute to a broader initiative, including our ICTbased cultural website in collaboration with ICHCAP, ensuring Bhutan's intangible heritage remains accessible and relevant for future generations.




